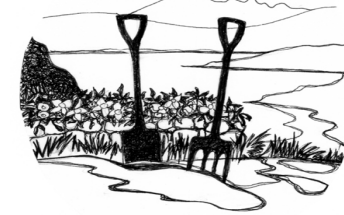

EXHIBITS

Entry per Class is £0.30 for adult Members and £0.50 for Non-members. Entry to individual young people and young people groups under 16 years is free for Group 5 entries. Young People entering Groups 1 to 4 must pay adult fees.

Points will be awarded for each Class on the following basis, First place 3 points, Second place 2 points and Third place 1 point.

Exhibits must not be removed until the awarding of prizes has been completed.

Vegetables

13. Clean vegetables by holding them under a cold water tap using a sponge to remove soil. Never use a brush.
14. Never use any oily substance to clean vegetables. Occasionally carrots are cleaned with butter, but easily seen and a judge will down point them.
15. When showing more than one vegetable in a given Class uniformity of size and colour is important. Vegetables should be free from blemishes and true to type.
16. Present your vegetables with the best side to the judge; first impressions can help a lot in the final decision.
17. Where practical vegetables should presented on a plate.
18. Lettuce: lift with roots intact, wash them thoroughly, wrap them in moist tissue and enclose in a plastic bag.
19. Courgettes: their length should not greater than 6".
20. Carrots and parsnips: there should be no forking with tops cut 3" from crown. The main root should be complete. Remove minor roots.

Hints for Exhibitors

General

1. Please read the Schedule very carefully and make sure you exhibit the type and number specified. Any exhibits containing the wrong type or number will be disqualified no matter how good and attractive they may be.

Flowers

2. All flowers should be shown when they are at the peak of their flowering and not looking tired. Remove all damaged petals and leaves.
3. Pull a day early and immerse the stems in water up to and almost touching the flowers. Store somewhere cool and dark.
4. Present the vase so that as much of the flower as possible can be seen by the judge. Tall stems should not be above one's eye level.
5. Never crowd a vase by gripping the stems together.

Pot Plants

6. Ensure the pot size is suitable for exhibit.
7. Make sure the pot is washed with no debris on the soil.
8. A pot plant is judged on the quality of its foliage as well as its flower. Make sure the foliage is clean and flowers bright.
9. Where appropriate, stake to show plant to best advantage, but hide stakes as much as possible.

Fruit

10. Show fruit full of colour and form
11. Fruit should be firm in texture.
12. The use of Virginia Creeper leaves placed on the plate helps preservation of the fruit.

Exhibition Rules (Please Read Carefully)

1. Entry to the exhibition is open to members and non-members.
2. The hall will be open for staging of exhibits from 10.30 am to 12.15 p.m. Exhibitors with numerous entries are requested to arrive early.
3. Every exhibit for competition must be accompanied by a card with the Exhibitor's name on one side and the other side marked with the Class to be competed in. The card is to be placed under the exhibit with the Class number facing upward. Cards are to be obtained from the Treasurer in the hall. Unlabelled entries shall be removed.
4. Judging will begin at 12.15 pm, at which time all exhibits complete with entry tickets must be in place and exhibitors must have left the hall. No person without the special permission of the Show Convener will be admitted to the Hall once judging has commenced.
5. Only one entry per person may be made in a given Class number, but more than one person in a household may compete in a Class.
6. Individual Class prizes may be claimed after the presentation of the Group trophies and prizes. All prizes must be claimed from the Treasurer within one week of the Show.
7. The positioning of exhibits is the sole responsibility of the Show Stewards. Exhibits in Group 1, Classes 1 to 33 shall be placed on 9 inch (230mm) diameter white paper plates provided by the Society.
8. When, within a given Class, two exhibits are judged to be equal "First", the sum offered for the "First and Second" prize will be divided equally and there will be no "Second" prize.
9. When within a Group two or more exhibitors have equal points the Group award will be presented to the exhibitor with the most "First" places.
10. No prize will be awarded unless, in the opinion of the Judges, the exhibit(s) are of suitable quality. First, Second and/or Third prizes may not be awarded as applicable.
11. A judge's decision is final and no review will be granted.
12. All exhibits must have been grown by and have been in the possession of the Exhibitor for two months prior to the Show.
13. Produce must be the sole work of the Exhibitor.
14. Any prize found to have been unfairly obtained will be forfeited, and if any article is discovered to have been tampered with for the purpose of deception, the Exhibitor shall forfeit all prize money and liable, in the case of a Member, to expulsion from the Society. Non-members will be banned from entering in subsequent Shows.
15. The Society will not be responsible for damage done to plants, vases, etc., during the Show but ordinary care of exhibits will be exercised throughout.
16. The Show Convener has the right to refuse any entry and in matters other than judging his/her decision is final.

Age up to 8yrs:

- 5.1 Collage picture made from natural materials e.g. leaves, petals, sticks, sand, shells etc,
- 5.2 Germinating bean in a clear jar.
- 5.3 Posy of flowers with at least six garden flowers.

Age from 9yrs to 12yrs:

- 5.4 Collage picture made from natural materials from the garden.
- 5.5 Miniature garden in a tray 300mm x 150mm (approx).
- 5.6 Herbs grown in a decorated plant pot.

Age from 13yrs to 15yrs:

- 5.7 Collage picture made from natural materials from the garden.
- 5.8 Photograph of an insect.
- 5.9 Vegetables growing in a pot such as peas or courgette.

Please note that a young person may also separately enter any of the Classes listed in Groups 1 to 4. Should they do so then the exhibit must be placed alongside the adult entries and the adult fee paid.
